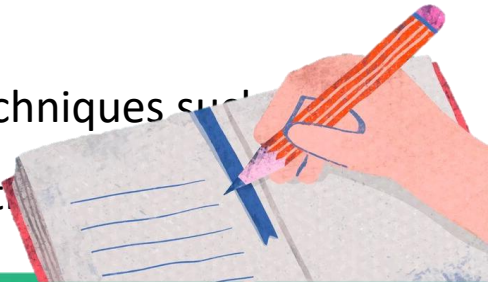

RECOUNT TEXT

- **PURPOSE:** To retell events and to inform and/or entertain.
- **STRUCTURE:**
 - It is often opened with a scene being set or other devices that establish context.
 - They provides an account of the events that took place, usually in chronological order.
 - The chronological structure can be reordered by using techniques such as flashbacks, etc., but generally, this is the domain of fiction.

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RECOUNT TEXT

- **Main Features:**

- Past tense is mostly used as recount texts relate events that already happened.
- Time connectives are used extensively to organize chronology (first, then, next, after that, etc.)
- Details are used extensively to flesh out the bare bones of the events.

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EXAMPLE OF RECOUNT

TITLE	TEXT
Orientation	I remember most memorable holiday I had was when I went hiking at Mt. Merbabu. In the beginning,. . .
Series of Events	The journey started on a sand truck from my high school to the first post for hikers located in Boyolali. It was . . .
Re-orientation	One of the most unforgettable moments for me was before reaching the top. We were . . .

CONNECTORS OF SEQUENCE TO ORDER EVENTS

- The connectors might be **first, then, after, after that, next, finally, etc.**
- Examples:
 - **First**, we had breakfast.
 - **Then**, we caught a bus to Kota Tua.
 - **Next**, we bought a ticket for Rumah Hantu Kota Tua.
 - **After that**, we entered the building and screamed a lot inside.
 - **Finally**, we were out of Rumah hantu Kota Tua and went home.



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THE USE OF “PREFER”

A. GENERAL PREFERENCES

PREFER TO + (INFINITIVE)	PREFER –ING
I prefer to eat fried rice	I prefer eating fried rice

1. I prefer tea to coffee.
2. I prefer driving to walking.
3. I prefer to drive rather than walk.



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THE USE OF “PREFER”

B. SPECIFIC PREFERENCES

- Would prefer = 'd prefer
- Would rather = Would prefer

Would rather (do) = would prefer (to do)

- Examples:

A: Would you prefer mixed fruit or chocolate
cake for dessert?
home.

A: Shall we go outside?

B: I'd rather stay



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B: I'd prefer chocolate, please.

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
